What Feeders Can Tell Us

Bird watching has been a popular past time for hundreds of years. It's because of early birders like John James Audubon and Florence Merriam Bailey who had a passion for watching birds that we have so much information about different species and their unique characteristics. While it continues to be popular as a hobby, many birders have taken their skills to the next level with Project Feeder Watch (PFW). FeederWatch is a winter-long (November-April) survey of birds that visit feeders in nature centers, community areas, and even peoples personal backyards. Here at Eastman we have a long history of participating in PFW with support from many volunteers. We caught up with Christy Bishop, Naturalist at ENC, who coordinates our PFW to learn more...

How many years has Eastman participated in PFW? This is our 25th year! This quarter century dovetails nicely with ENC 50th Anniversary. That is an amazing commitment. What statistics has ENC logged? In that 25 year span, we have entered 283 total counts, with a total of 40 different bird species, and countless hours invested by our awesome dedicated volunteers.

While we can guess some of the usual winter bird "suspects" like chickadees, juncos and blue jays, what have been some of the prizes? It's been fun to see Common Redpoll, Pine Siskin, Purple Finches, Northern Shrike, Sharp-shinned hawk and Common Flicker.

Even though Eastman has plenty of volunteers for PFW already, can other volunteers participate on their own from home? Yes! Anyone with some birdfeeders can participate. The Feeder watch website has great training info for bird ID and data collection. <u>www.feederwatch.org</u> What do you think people should know about PFW that they might not know? It's a great introduction to citizen science. It's very flexible, a fun way to learn more about birds, while contributing to an important dataset of bird distribution and abundance in North America.

Seasonal Reflection

A Winter Bust could be the 2024 theme in our region. Last year we were pushing 50" of snow, tracking with each new snowfall and got over 1200 people out on snowshoes! This year its like winter didn't feel like showing up at all. That has meant many alternative programs and some programs with record numbers (due to warm temperatures), and still others we had to skip entirely like snowflake preservation. As our climate continues to be less predictable, we always plan for contingency. A BIG WIN with volunteers was the solstice luminary walk in December. Our thanks to those who staged, lit, and cleaned up hundreds of luminaries.



Not a single snowshoe has been rented, but the Sunday Fires have continued to be popular. Thank you volunteers for continuing to put these on for us each Sunday!

Little Free Library— Last summer the ENC Little Free Library (LFL) was added to the front yard. One of our volunteers, Dick Campbell, designed and built it. It is slowly catching on with park visitors. All books are natural history focused and are staged for both youth and adults. Check it out next time you come to Eastman.

Some of you have contributed books to our LFL— thank you! If you or someone you know has nature books to donate, bring them to the ENC front desk and build our backstock. We review all books for content and accuracy. When possible, the best books for the LFL are for local natural history, but we take fictional chapter books with a nature setting, children's book, field guides, and books about nature from other countries. (Shout out to that *All About Giraffes* book found in there this winter!)

Sometimes local public libraries have sales or purges; keep your eyes out!

Save the Dates for Eastman Nature Center 50th Anniversary— While the current nature center is only 12 years old, there has been a center at our location for 50 years. The staff at Eastman will have several ways to celebrate this awesome milestone in 2024.
